# DHS earns place on AP Honor Roll Delano is the only Minnesota school to qualify

When the College Board released its 10th annual AP Honor Roll on Thursday, Dec. 5, Delano High School stood alone as the only Minnesota school to qualify.

Only 250 schools in the United States and Canada earned the honor by simultaneously increasing access to AP courses and increasing the percentage of students earning scores of 3 or higher (out of a possible 5).

"Honor roll districts defy the expectation that expanding access automatically results in a decline in the percentage of exams earning scores of 3 or better," said Andy Houpt of the College Board.

2019 marks the fourth time in the last five years that Delano has qualified for the AP Honor Roll, a distinction that is particularly difficult to achieve as a result of the requirements to increase both participation and performance.

"This is just another example of the excellent work that our teachers, students and administrators do to maintain a high level of academic excellence in our high school," said Delano Superintendent Matt Schoen. "To be the only high school in the state is quite an achievement. We continue to work hard on growing our college-level courses in the high school. The willingness of our students to challenge themselves in the classroom is an example of the strong support of our family community, along with the high level of expectations for our schools in Delano."

### Keys to success

DHS Principal Dr. Steve Heil said Delano's inclusion on the honor roll is the result of several factors.

"We work really hard as a high school to increase the access of all of our students have to college level material and coursework while in high school," he said. "It shows the hard work that our students do in the classroom, with homework and in taking the assessments. And it also shows the work the staff does with the students so the students are learning the material and remembering the material. The

AP tests are so in depth you really have to learn the subject matter. You can't just memorize it and then forget it."

Heil said that Delano does not place any restrictions on taking an AP course, unlike some other districts. Students

do not have to attain a certain grade point average, class rank or minimum level of performance in prior classes, for example.

"Our AP staff tells students, 'If you want the challenge, please take the course.' So you free the students up to think, 'I can do this,'" said Heil. "Once

you get to sophomore, junior, senior year, we really like the kids that want to challenge themselves to challenge themselves. The students know they've got a higher work load and they work hard at it. It turns out pretty well."

Delano High School offers AP courses in biology, human geography, US government and politics, US history, and art. Heil said the expectation in those courses is that students are doing college-level coursework, but teachers also focus on imparting strategies students can use in note-taking, textbook reading and more to prepare them for post-secondary learning.

"AP is about teaching kids how to do a college-level class as much as it is learning college-level material," Heil said. "That's not always true in every school or class."

• In addition to AP classes, Delano High School offers 10 College in the Schools courses, which also allow high school students to pursue college-level materials and credits, but are structured somewhat differently and do have a number of eligibility requirements.

## Tigers claim third at state swim meet

## Kern sets individual state record in 100 backstroke

As a team, Delano swimmers and divers took third place at the Class A state meet Nov. 14-16. Along the way, the Tigers also picked up a state record and individual championship.

Delano scored 145 points to tie with Sauk Centre for third in competition at the University of Minnesota Aquatic Center. Visitation of Mendota Heights won its seventh consecutive title with 318 points, and Hutchinson took second with 250 points.

### Individual results

Freshman Emma Kern set a new state record of 55.35 in the 100 backstroke to claim the individual championship. She also took fourth place in the 100 butterfly.

Another swimmer to qualify for individual competition, Kylie Strobl, took eighth place in the 100 freestyle and ninth in the 200 freestyle.

Other individual highlights included Laila Rosenow qualifying for state in the 100 fly, and Avery Lommel becoming the first diver to ever represent Delano at state.

### Relay results

Delano's relay teams also did well. The 400 freestyle relay team of Strobl, Rosenow, Kern and Shelby Benker took third place.

The 200 medley relay took

fourth at state, with Kern, Rosenow, Abby Wadholm and Annabelle Wentzel competing.

The 200 freestyle relay team of Sydney York, Rosenow, Strobl and Josie Strobl took fifth place.

## Barduson, Lommel sign letters of intent

A pair of Delano High School pitchers signed National Letters of Intent to compete at the next level on Wednesday, Nov. 13.

Senior Cade Lommel will play Division I baseball at Creighton University in Omaha, Nebraska, and Lexi Barduson signed to play Division II softball at Minot State University in North Dakota.

"I think it's usually about 3 percent of high school kids that get to go on and play at the collegiate level, so it's a pretty amazing opportunity that they've gotten to that spot," said Delano Activities Administrator Ryan Tool at the opening of the signing ceremony.

# Football, runner also make state

It was a banner year for Delano High School's fall sports teams, which had highlights on the field, court and in the pool.

In addition to the thirdplace finish at state for the girls swim team (see Page 3 for information), the football team advanced to the state quarterfinals, and cross country runner Grace Jostock competed at the state meet after placing 13th overall at sections.

The football team defended its section title with a 17-14 overtime win over top-seeded Becker, but could not solve Rocori in the state quarterfinals. A final highlight of the season was the selection of senior two-way lineman Spencer Poll for the South All-Star Team, which will compete in Minneapolis.

Jostock, a junior, ran in her first state meet at St. Olaf College and became the first Delano girl to run at state since 2010, according to the Delano Herald Journal.

## **Signing**

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"I can't wait for this new adventure," she said.

Delano softball coach AnnaMarie Martino called Barduson "a bulldog of a pitcher" and "a true team player."

"Lexi is one of the hardest working softball players I've ever coached," said Martino. "She is a kid who truly puts in the time outside of the school ball season to make sure she is able to perform at her best for her team. While Lexi isn't always the most vocal player on the team, she definitely shows her leadership through her actions both on and off the field."

Barduson plans to study criminal justice. Her parents are Steven and Cynthia Barduson.

### Cade Lommel

DHS baseball coach Jeff Olson said Lommel made an immediate impression with the high school coaching staff as a freshman.

"It really jumped out to us as coaches who hadn't seen him throw. The talent was there, obviously, and getting to know him as a kid, as a player, was equally awesome," said Olson, adding that Lommel became a member of the varsity pitching staff that first year and even took the ball in the section playoffs against an eventual state champion Waconia squad.

"Cade got the nod against them in the section playoffs, the third round, so for a freshman to get that kind of matchup against a team of that caliber, it would be a lot for anybody to take on," said Olson. "But Cade threw the heck out of the ball and gave us an outstanding chance to win. We fell just short, 3-2 I think the score was, but it said a lot about him. It was an early indication of the special kid and special player that he was."

In his address, Lommel thanked his teammates, coaches, and especially his parents for guiding him.

"Mom, you always made sure I was getting good grades and challenging myself, whether it was school or sports," he said. "Dad, I always remember that whether it was a baseball or hockey game, you were never disappointed with how I performed, but only if my attitude was poor. That taught me a lot about how to have

fun playing sports, and that no matter how good or bad I was that you guys would always support me."

Olson said he was looking forward to having Lommel on his staff one more season, and said Creighton was getting a high quality person.

"Talent is obviously a huge part of it, but with Cade, what I think of is his character, the hard work, the effort he brings to everything and attitude that he brings every day," said Olson. "Those are the things that stand out to me and his teammates everybody that knows him."

Lommel plans to study either finance or medicine. He is the son of Cory and Molly Lommel.

## Partners join DHS for Veterans Day

The annual Veterans Day ceremony at Delano High School included a variety of unique elements this year, including a presentation of the Sgt. Dillon Semolina memorial plaque, a donation to the Delano American Legion by Charter Spectrum and HISTORY (The History Channel), and remarks from keynote speaker Sen. Bruce Anderson.

Another highlight included recognition of Mackenzie Oswell, Lauren Kantrovich and Hannah Kreisch for winning an essay contest focusing on why it is important to recognize veterans. Oswell, the overall winner, read her essay following the announcement of the winners.

"They chose to fight, they said goodbye to their families, and they fought with all they had, even if it meant returning a different person," Oswell wrote. "None of us will ever understand what they went through, but we can look to them and say, 'Thank you for serving."

Anderson, himself a retired service member who spent time in the Navy, Minnesota Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve, also spoke about the unique experience of veterans.

"Often, veterans feel isolated because their sacrifice is





impossible to understand for those who have not endured it themselves," Anderson said. "That's why today is especially important. Recognizing them and thanking them for their service is your impactful gesture, and goes a long way toward making those patriots feel part of the community, the community of Delano."

In other aspects of the ceremony, Oswell and Caitlyn Bekkala were recognized for participating in Girls State, the Legion baseball team was recognized, and the DHS Wind Ensemble performed.

## Kunkel, Fitzer recognized as leaders

Four staff members from Delano Public Schools received Leaders in Educational Excellence Awards during a ceremony at the River's Edge Convention Center in St. Cloud on Wednesday, Oct. 23.

Those honored were DHS media center specialist Monica Kunkel, DES Title 1 teacher Karla Vieau, sixth-grade teacher Sara Potter, and DHS Spanish teacher John Fitzer.

### Monica Kunkel

Since she began her teaching career in 1988, Kunkel has covered a lot of ground and built a wealth of experience in districts big and small. She started her career as a French and English teacher in Ironwood, Michigan, then served as a media specialist for Minneapolis Public Schools, Minnetonka Public Schools, and Breck School. This school year marks Kunkel's 12th in Delano.

"I loved school when I was young and had some really great teachers that I admired," said Kunkel. "One of them was the high school librarian. I was also an avid reader, making use of the bookmobile all summer since we lived 17 miles from the nearest library."

The seeds of her future career were planted in high school when she served as a library aid and discovered the satisfaction of helping others

find tools for learning.

"I found the hunt for difficult-to-find resources to be fun and challenging," said Kunkel. "I knew then that I wanted to be a school librarian when I grew up."

Because school media specialists need their teaching degree, license and at least three years of teaching experience, Kunkel said she pursued an interest in the French language on her way to earning her teaching credentials. She then moved from Michigan's Upper Peninsula to Minneapolis and began her graduate program to become a licensed school media specialist through Mankato State University.

"This award is such an honor because I have been nominated by a colleague who was moved to praise the work I do on a daily basis," said Kunkel. "I look at my fellow award winners and the list of nominees

and am humbled to be grouped with such amazing educators."

The nomination statement for Kunkel's award cited her active leadership among her colleagues, both on the district technology committee and as the current president of the Delano Teachers Association.

"Monica is constantly looking for new and innovative ways to help our students achieve excellence in all aspects of their lives," said the nomination. "She is a strong leader in her building and throughout the district."

While she is busy in various behind-the-scenes endeavors that shape Delano Public Schools, Kunkel said she derives the most satisfaction from working directly with students.

"My favorite part is connecting a reluctant reader to a book he or she really enjoys," Kunkel said. "I also really enjoy helping students locate resources for

their classroom projects -- the harder the resource is to locate, the more I enjoy it."

### John Fitzer

Fitzer also represented Delano High School at the banquet in his capacity as the 2018-19 Delano Teacher of the Year. He is in his 30th year of teaching at Delano and 34th overall.

"I'm very passionate about what I do. I love what I do. I can't imagine doing anything else," said Fitzer in a Teacher of the Year interview last year. "I don't consider this a job. It's not work to me. I just love being with the kids and seeing their eyes open to new things."

Fitzer said what he enjoys most about his job is seeing students grow up into young adults, and hearing from former students about where they have gone and what they have done after high school.

Teaching has come naturally, as he was the primary organizer for activities in his neighborhood while growing up, and was able to find satisfaction in the success of others.

"I've known I wanted to be a teacher since I was 12 years old," said Fitzer. "It just always felt really good when people succeeded at something and I was able to help with that."

### Anderson's address

Anderson spent over 30 years in the military, but spoke little of his own experiences during his address.

Instead, Anderson spoke of the service of his father, a World War II veteran, and other family members and acquaintances. He shared the history of Veterans Day and its origins in the armistice that ended World War I, and the emphasized the importance of recognizing the sacrifice of those who do serve.

"We go about our daily lives mowing our yards, running our errands, doing our homework," Anderson said. "We enjoy so many freedoms that others around the world can't even imagine. And most of the time, we don't even give them a second thought."

Anderson challenged those present to make the most of the opportunities they have as a result of the sacrifice of others.

"Today I encourage you to take a moment to reflect on your freedoms, the privilege it is to enjoy your education, dream for your future, and look forward to all that will one day make this world a better place for all of us to live," he said. "Be wise with the gifts that you've been given. Do not squander your freedom. But rather channel the strength of the men and women who have served and given their lives for you. ...

"I have hope in your generation that you will recognize what we have to lose and continue to fight for it so that all that has been done before you will not be in vain. ... Freedom is not just a word, but a sacrificial treasure given to each one of us this day."

## Aviation class hosts celebrity flyer

KDWB radio personality Dave Ryan visited the DHS Aviation class on Friday, Nov. 15, to talk about his own experiences as a private pilot.

"As a pilot, we all have stories," he said. "It's just a matter of finding an audience that wants to hear it."

He also shared memorabilia from his father, a B-24 navigator who survived 50 combat missions in WWII. Items Ryan brought included shrapnel from flak that his father had collected from inside his bomber, and a handwritten account of a near-death experience with anti-aircraft fire.

The account explained that his father had left his usual position in the bomber's nose, and upon his return he found a hole where he normally would have been sitting.

"I'm very lucky that my dad made it back," Ryan said.

Ryan also passed around a number of his father's medals, including the Distinguished Flying Cross, and shared audio from a "runway incursion" that demonstrated the importance of accurate communication at busy airports.

Class instructor Jason Monke explained that he had heard

Ryan discuss flying several times on the radio and decided to email and see if a visit would be possible. Ryan responded that he would enjoy coming to share, and has already indicated that he would be more than willing to return next year as well

Becoming a pilot

Ryan told students he began flying about 25 years ago, taking nine months and spending \$5,000 to get his private pilot's license. Influences to begin flying, he said, included his father, as well as proximity to a small airport at his childhood home, where he enjoyed watching planes take off and land.

Since 1993 Ryan said he has logged about 550 to 600 hours of flight time without any serious mishaps, although he was forced to land quickly at Sauk Centre on one occasion when his engine began to sputter. Ryan said that a misunderstanding on the part of airport personnel resulted in a large emergency response from

fire and police personnel who arrived looking for a crash and were somewhat nonplussed to find him and his plane intact.

### Student questions

Students asked questions about Ryan's favorite types of planes to fly (low-wing models), bird strikes (more common than one might think), and his most unique flying experiences (flying with the Navy's Blue Angels and Air Force's Thunderbird demonstration squadrons).

Ryan said that the Blue Angels fly without G-suits that help compensate for extreme maneuvers, and he experienced tunnel vision from lack of blood flow to the brain while riding along with them.

Students also asked about renting vs. buying a plane, and Ryan said he has always rented, which isn't cheap but eliminates hanger fees and maintenance concerns.

"I had a great time and it was an honor to tell you about my dad's flying experiences and talk about Aviation," Ryan wrote on a Delano Public Schools Facebook post about his visit. "Great group of students! Thank you Mr. Monke for having me!"

## State Patrol to present 'Lasting Impact'

## Book drive to benefit classrooms

In an effort to bolster classroom libraries, Delano Public Schools will hold a book drive during January conferences and during the month of February, which is "I Love to Read Month."

What can be donated? New or gently used books that are appropriate for K-8 students; books that are classics, are well-loved, or have a copyright date of 2010 or later; or money for book bins and shelves to support classroom libraries.

Why are donations needed? Research indicates that K-8 class-rooms should have about 350 books within each room to support a literature-rich experience for young readers. This year's literacy initiative, and the adoption of the new K-4 language arts curriculum, rely heavily on this concept.

If you would like to receive a text message, you must set this option up in your family access account. Log into your account and on the left, click on Skylert. You can list your phone number under "Text Message Numbers" and check the categories for which you want this option applied. Then click "Save."
