Why is Delano Public Schools Asking for More Money from the Taxpayers?

I would like to take this opportunity to share with you facts and information about Delano Public Schools with respect to our funding situation. In 2002, voters of the Delano Public School district approved a 10 year operating levy that brought much needed revenue to our district. This existing levy is expiring and funding will cease at the end of the 2012-2013 school year. This expiring levy represents approximately 1.1 million dollars of revenue in our school district budget.


Last fall, the school district asked voters for an increase in the dollar amount per student to support the educational programs in our schools. That levy failed thus requiring the school board to make spending cuts and increase fees. In the spring of 2012, our district tightened it's belt and made approximately \$750,000 in cuts and fee increases in order to remain fiscally responsible. Even with these additional cuts and increases the school district is still deficit spending approximately \$300,000 from our reserves.

There will be two questions on the ballot this November. Question 1 will ask voters to renew the existing operating levy. Voters will be asked to renew the current levy at \$426.86 per student. If Question 1 passes, there will be no tax impact. Question 2 will ask voters to approve an increase to the operating levy of \$325 per student. This amount will help bring in additional revenue that is needed due to years of inadequate funding from the state of Minnesota. If Question 2 passes, it will raise property taxes by approximately \$12 per month for the average homeowner in Delano. The average home in Delano is valued at \$220,000.

If only Question 1 passes and Question 2 doesn't, the school district will need to make additional cuts to programs and staff, raise fees, and class sizes will increase. The passing of Question 1 only will not meet the revenue needed to continue educational excellence in the Delano Public School district.

The problem we have in Delano is a revenue problem, not a spending problem. Delano's existing levy is lower than most neighboring districts as shown in the chart to the right. What will the increase in dollars levied do for you, students, community members and business owners? It will alleviate additional program/staff cuts, class size increases and fee increases. If our schools start to decline, the entire community will feel the impact. Property values and sale prices are higher in strong, high performing school districts and local businesses thrive in communities with strong schools.

I encourage you to be informed and remember to vote on November 6. We will continue to exhaust all efforts in providing the ultimate public school education for every student at an extremely efficient and effective cost basis.

Delano Elementary School Earns Reward School Designation

Under the Multiple Measurement Rating (MMR), Minnesota's new measurement of school performance, Delano Elementary School has been identified as a Reward School. The school's MMR is based on points earned in test proficiency, student growth and achievement gap reduction.

According to the Minnesota Department of Education, a Reward School is the highest performing 15 percent of elementary schools in the state. These schools will be identified every year and publicly recognized for their good work.

This recognition relects the gains Delano Elementary has made in proficiency, growth and achievement gap reduction. Delano Elementary School received very good results on the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments with 93.3% of third grade students earning an achievement level of meeting or exceeding the standards in Reading and 93.3% in Math. Fourth grade students had 94.6% of the students in the top two achievement levels in Reading and 95.1% in Math. This reward is a reflection of the school staff's tireless efforts to improve outcomes for students.



As a school district, it is nice to share the successes of our schools with the community. Thanks to the elementary school staff, parents and students for their tireless efforts in achieving such great success.

Delano Schools Needs Your Family Census Information

Each year, school districts throughout Minnesota are required by state law to conduct a census of the students who live within the district. The census information allows our school district to:

- Have on file the names of preschool age children for Early Childhood Health and Developmental Screening (Preschool Screening).
- Have on file the names of upcoming kindergarteners for Kindergarten Round-Up and other pertinant enrollment and program information.
- Help determine the funding for Early Childhood Family Education.
- Help determine the funding for Learner Readiness, as well as other school programs.

Parents are asked to report their family census information by calling the Early Childhood Family Education office at 763.972.6210, press 4, by email at <u>ishaffer@delano.k12.mn.us</u> or by mailing your census information to: Community Education Center, 140 Elm Avenue E., Delano, MN, 55328. The census information requested includes: Parent/Guardian Name(s), County of residence, home address, home telephone number, name and birthdates of all children.

Rather than conducting a time consuming and costly door-to-door or telephone census, the School District is asking parents to help in this endeavor. Your assistance ensures that the Delano School District receives full program funding from the State of Minnesota, and it is greatly appreciated. The information that the school district collects will be used only for school business and will be handled in a confidential manner.

Open Enrollment Information

According to Minnesota Statutes 124D.03, "Once enrolled in a nonresident district, the pupil may remain enrolled and is not required to submit annual or periodic applications. To return to the resident district or to transfer to a different nonresident district, the parent or guardian of the pupil must provide notice to the resident district or apply to a different nonresident district by January 15 for enrollment beginning the following school year."

Delano Public Schools Expand Project Lead the Way® Program

Project Lead the Way® (PLTW) was integrated into the Dela no Middle School curriculum during the 2009-2010 school year This program's curriculum offers five 9-week units that are calle Gateway to Technology which focuses on developing stronger math, science and technology inquiry skills by showing, not telling, students how engineers use technology to solve everyday problems. Classes began in the eighth grade with Design and Modeling and Automation and Robotics, sixth grade curriculum was added with the *Magic of Electrons*. In the fall of 2010-11, Science and Technology was added to the middle school curriculum and is taught to seventh graders. During this semester long class, students are taught about basic physics through the six simple machines, the conservation of potential and kinetic energy, the force of gravity and alternative energy for our future. The cornerstone of student learning is the projects the students' build. The Rube Goldberg Machine project allow students to put forth new found knowledge of the six simple machines and Newton's Law of Energy and for the Alternative Energy unit, the students are able to build their own alternative energy website and design wind turbine blades. These projects are all done through collaborative brainstorming, creative inver tion and criticial problem-solving. All these classes are activity oriented programs designed to challenge and engage the natu curiosity of middle school student minds. They also provide a unique opportunity for students to gain exposure to technology through engaging activities and developing an understanding o how technology will impact their future.

As students move on to Delano High School, Project Lead the Way classes are offered beginning in 9th grade through graduation. DHS began with *Introduction to Engineering Design* and began offering the *Principles of Engineering* in the fall of 2011-12. Beginning in the fall of 2012-13, the third of three foundational cources in the PLTW curriculum will be offered, *Digital Electronics*. At the secondary level, these PLTW courses are considered the Pathway to Engineering (PTE) program.


Food Service Policies for ALL Delano Public School Students and Their Families

It is your responsibility to keep track of your student's foc service account. You can do this on Family Access by checking your payments, purchases, and current balanc under "Food Service." Accounts cannot be negative by more than \$5.00. Delano Public Schools sends out an email and phone notification when your account reaches \$5.00. Although, if your email address has not been provided to the school district, you will not receive email notification. Your student(s) are also told at checkout in the lunch line when they need money to be deposited in their account and low balance slips are available at each computer station to take as a reminder for the students. To avoid low balances, we recommend that you set a personal email notification. This feature provides an automatic email notification when your balance reaches \$10.00. To do this, follow these steps:
