Greetings, DMS Tiger families. Big changes are coming to DMS over the next month due to construction.

It is expected that the new high school entrance will open on Monday, Nov. 20. At that time, the middle school entrance (Door 8) will be shut down so that work can begin on the diving well addition to the pool.

Please continue to use the tennis parking lot as our dropoff and pick-up zones. A safe walking path through the exist-



ing drive lane immediately in front of school will be available for students to safely access the

front of the building without walking through the parking lot. Your cooperation with traffic so far has been tremendous. Thank you!

Once the new entrance is available, students will have access to the new and improved cafeteria and office spaces. The only element to complete in this area will be the cafeteria floor. It will remain concrete until the summer so the final work can be completed in an uninterrupted manner. All students and visitors can visit

An annonymous nomination submitted to the district's Staff Development Committee



emphasized Longstreet's value.

I am really just doing my job to the best of my ability every day," Longstreet said. "Physical fitness is an important component to leading a healthy life and I get to be an introductory part of that process for students."

Longstreet said his job is "a lot of fun," and that he enjoys helping students develop skills in leadership and teamwork.

"Jamie Longstreet is a leader in education in a subject that is often looked at last because it isn't a 'core' subject or it's just fun and games," said the nomination. "(But) ... look at what he has done with his students and athletes from beginning to end, and then decide if he helped prepare them for the real world; you won't find many that have done as much."

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Standout singers earn honors

Three Delano Middle School choir students will perform with a statewide honor choir later this month.

Seventh-graders Katelin Weber and Bella Molitor, along with eighth-grader Autumn Langdon, have been chosen to sing with the 150-member American Choral Directors Association of Minnesota Select Honors Choir. They will perform at St. John's Lutheran Church in Mahtomedi on Saturday, Nov. 18, as part of the ACDA state conference for choral directors.

"I'm very pleased for Autumn, Bella and Katelin. They represent the level of excellence we work toward in our choir classes," said middle school choir director Sandy Meyerson. "We have many fine singers, and I know that these three will represent Delano well in the state honors choir. I've observed their hard work

and dedication to improve at every rehearsal and the joy they take in performing. Their willingness to accept challenging repertoire, set goals for personal excellence, and work with the choir as a team make them well-prepared for the experience of honor choir."

Each of the students has enjoyed making music as a part of their school experience. "I enjoy singing immensely," said Langdon, a soprano 2 who has sung in choral groups since fourth grade. "Music is open to interpretation, and you can always improve."

Weber and Molitor said the opportunity to engage the heart is what they enjoyed most as musicians.

"I like singing because you can show emotion," said Weber, a soprano 1.

"I like choir because I can express myself," said Molitor, a soprano 2.

The ACDA of Minnesota organizes six honor choirs per year for students in grades four through 10. More than 2,400 students audition each year for those choirs, and about 800 are selected to participate.

"It's a joy to work with all our fine singers at DMS, and to have our program recognized with the inclusion of three singers in the 2017 honor choir," said Meyerson.

Staying positive, and keys to homework success

Greetings from Delano Middle School! The first trimester is flying by so fast! Our students are doing very well. Every day I see examples of students working hard to do their best.

Despite the construction, I see beautiful student artwork displayed in the halls and smiles on the faces of students, staff and families. Being positive over the course of a school year is a challenge. It is more than just an "attitude." Remaining positive requires practice, coping skills and flexibility.

Thank you for your help in teaching students to adapt to changes and how to cope when something doesn't go as planned. As a staff, we work hard to have positive dialogues with students and families. Our



goal is to listen first in order to understand.

Homework

Middle school is a time to adjust to the steep learning curve for homework. We highly recommend setting effective routines, habits and expectations to help students achieve their goals and reach their learning standards. Please consider your plan. An effective routine is for your student to write their homework assignments in a planner of some sort. Check the teachers' websites for additional information and calendar details.

Next, set aside the same time in the afternoon or evening to complete homework. Choose the same comfortable (and well-lighted) place in your home for your student to complete work. Finally, trust but verify with your student that he/she has their homework completed by having them share the details with you.

Middle school is the time to start tilting the balance to the student to be more independent and accountable for his/ her own homework habits. It is a gradual process. Celebrate and reward for a job well done!

Finally, we offer homework

help for all students after school (3-4:30 p.m.) on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays. A staff member supervises the students in the fifth-grade commons computer lab. Students are expected to sign in and sign out. If they leave the homework help area, they must remain in the middle school commons and wait quietly for their ride at Door 8.

However, these waiting locations will most likely change to the new front entrance of the high school near Thanksgiving as we begin to close down the middle school office entrance. Please look for these updates as they occur.

Students step up for safety

Two Delano Middle School students have taken it upon themselves to help promote safety for pedestrians on the Delano Public Schools campus.

Justin and Kyra Machakaire, a brother and sister in grades seven and six, respectively, now don traffic vests and wield a "School Stop Patrol" flag as crossing guards almost every morning and afternoon at the entrance to the bus parking lot on the north side of the high school-middle school building.


"Unless we're sick or have something else we have to do, we're pretty much there every day," said Justin.

That includes bad weather days. On Friday, Nov. 3, the Machakaires took their 15- to 20-minute afternoon shift amidst heavy snow and a wintry breeze.

"We want to get more kids doing this, because if there are days that me and my sister absolutely can't do it, then we need other people to step in and take that day and help out," said Justin. "Who knows, the day we're not there an accident could happen."

DMS Principal Barry Voight explained that the crosswalk that leads from the school up the hill toward the elementary and a large student parking area needs more attention this year than most, because while buses formerly entered there and then exited the other direction around the school, construction this year means that buses are both entering and exiting, along with private vehicles.

"We needed to really focus on student safety there this year," Voight said. "We've always had somebody at the intersection at the end of the day, but never in the morning before school. With more students parking at the top of the hill, there is a greater need to control traffic and students."

Though the middle school has not used student crossing guards in the past, Voight said the Machakaires approached him early in the school year for permission to take up the task. They explained that the idea came from their summer participation in Legionville, where they were trained as crossing guards and also picked up other skills in water safety, canoe safety, first aid and more.

"The most impressive part is that they're the ones that sought us out, and it's always nice to see kids that want to help out and make a difference and volunteer their time," said Voight. "It was entirely their own initiative that led to this. Had they not come to see me we would have been managing traffic in that intersection all year long without some additional help, just trying to piece together staff to get it done. So they provide some consistency, that's for sure. We're grateful for their service."

District administrators provided some additional training specific to the intersection – giving instructions on where

to stand and pointing out that buses have the right-of-way rather than pedestrians, for example. There is often a staff member present also, though Voight pointed out that the students can actually be more consistent at times because they aren't subject to meetings, parent phone calls and other demands on a teacher's time.

Both Justin and Kyra said they hope more students will get involved so additional crosswalks around campus can be covered.

"We've tried to get a couple of other kids to join. There have been a few who seemed interested, so I've been trying to encourage them," said Kyra. "It's only one crosswalk that we're doing. We'd like to cover all the crosswalks."

Voight said any interested students could visit him to talk about the opportunity and get connected to training.

"The staff and I have talked about that too, because there are certainly more intersections that could use crossing guards up and down Tiger Drive," he said. "There might be opportunities to grow."

Art boosts community spirit

The artistic talents of Delano Middle School seventh-graders will be visible around the streets of Delano next year, as a unique partnership continues with the city.

Out of 69 students in Laura Holland's first-trimester art class, designs from 18 students were chosen by a group of anonymous staff members for conversion to light pole banners. All of Holland's students then worked in teams of four to finish painting the banners before the end of October.

"The banners are a lot of fun and the kids enjoy making them for sure," said Holland, who is in her fourth year at Delano. "The kids look forward to this."

The partnership with the city to display student-designed and painted banners began years ago. Banners are hung around downtown, on the highway bridge and in other locations for one to three years, with older student banners coming down at the end of each school year to make room for the new designs.

This year students were encouraged to create their banners with the themes of kindness or safety, but were not limited to those subjects. All 69 students created a design that uses specific techniques, and finalists were chosen for the painted banners based on quality and variety.

"It's going to be fun being around town, seeing my banner and saying, 'Hey, I made

that. That one is mine," said Nadia Slavek, one of the design winners whose banner featured the fireside offering of a hot drink amidst snow-capped pines.

Another winner, Samantha Krampf, said staff members had plenty of good options to choose from.

"I was not expecting mine to get chosen because I saw a lot of other projects and I thought they were really good," she said. Her design (shown on Page 1) featured a pair of ice skaters, one giving the other a hand up after a spill.

Working as a team

After the 18 final designs were chosen, students were split into four-person teams for the painting process. Ruby Taylor, another winner, said that input from other students improved the final product.

"The others changed it and made it look better," she said.

Slavek agreed.

"There were a lot more ideas from working with a group. I actually liked how it turned out more than if I had just painted it myself," she said.

Teamwork and cooperation were keys to the project.

"You want to go with your plan, but the group has other ideas and you need to be

able to work with those too," said Krampf.

The banners are made of a plastic-type canvas, and student used four coats of acrylic paint to bring their designs to life. Getting the details right was difficult, and the process took patience.

"If you made a mistake on one day you couldn't just fix it right away. You had to wait for the paint to dry," said Slavek.

Holland worked with the students on their technique, making sure no brushstrokes were visible unless that was an intentional technique, and at the end of the year she will lacquer coat the paintings to make them weatherproof for as long as they are publicly displayed.

"This is a good project," said Holland.
"It gives them a sense of pride and ownership and responsibility in here to do their best work."
