Building Projects Begin

Fall is upon us and so are the building construction projects! I would like to take this opportunity to update our school community regarding our current and future building plans. Our current projects that are in construction include the expansion of the elementary cafeteria and vestibule, and creating a secured entrance and adding an elevator to the community education building. In addition, we have completed some utility relocation of electrical transformers in preparation of building the

performing arts center and expansion of the high school building. These projects are progressing nicely and are slated to be completed by the end of 2016.

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Elementary Cafeteria and Vestibule Expansion

The district's goal is to bid out all of the other building projects yet this fall. The first project that was bid out in September was the synthetic turf fields, including the addition of two tennis courts. The district opened sealed bids on Thursday, September 22, awarding the contract to Peterson Companies. Shortly hereafter, the district will facilitate the bidding process for the new intermediate school that will include the construction of new locker rooms adjacent to the hockey arena. Once that has been completed, we will bid the remainder of the building projects, which include the addition and redesign of the high school/middle school building, construction of the performing arts center and additions to the Tiger Activity Center. The bidding process is extremely important as it will give guidance regarding the scope of each project. Once the bids have all been approved by the school board, construction may begin yet this fall


2017 National Merit SemiFinalists and Commended Students Announced

depending on the contractor's schedule.

DHS seniors Jack Weber and Seth Thoelke, pictured top right, were chosen as Semifinalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program (NMSC). These academically talented students have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,500 National Merit Scholarships worth nearly \$33 million that will be offered in the spring of 2017. From the approximately 16,000 Semifinalists, about 15,000 are expected to advance to the Finalist level. To become a Finalist, a Semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be

endorsed and recommended by the high school principal, write an essay and earn SAT scores that confirm the students earlier performance on the qualifying Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.

Allysa Dunnigan, Tucker Sjomeling and Stephanie Almquist, pictured bottom right, received Letters of Commendation in recognition of their outstanding academic promise from the NMSC. Although Commended Students do not continue in the competition for National Merit Scholarships, some of these students do become candidates for Special Scholarships sponsored by corporations or businesses.





We hope that this recognition will contribute to the Delano High School students' educational opportunities. At DHS we continually encourage all students to strive to realize their academic potential.

Every Student Succeeds Act Replaces No Child Left Behind

No Child Left Behind (NCLB) which was signed into law by President George W. Bush in 2002, was the federal response to a national concern that the American education system was no longer internationally competitive. NCLB significantly increased the federal role in holding schools responsible for the academic progress of all students. Under the NCLB law, states were required to test students in reading and math in grades 3 through 8 and once in high school. These tests, known in Minnesota as the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment (MCA) tests and under this law, schools are kept on track toward their goals through a mechanism know as Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP). Schools must then report their results, for both the student population as a whole and for particular "subgroups" of students, i.e. English-learners, special education, racial minorities, and low income families. This law also required states to ensure teachers are "highly qualified," which means that they have a bachelor's degree in the subject they are teaching and state certification.

On December 10, 2015, President Obama signed the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), which replaces No Child Left Behind legislation. This new law builds on key areas of progress made possible by the efforts of educators, communities, parents, and students across the country. In addition, ESSA rolls back much of the federal government's big footprint in education policy, on everything from testing and teacher quality to low-performing schools. It gives states more flexibility in education planning and policy. For the first time, this law will require all students in America be taught to high academic standards that will prepare them to suc-

ceed in college and careers. Every Student Succeeds Act takes full effect in the 2017-2018 school year. Individual states will have to submit accountability plans to the U.S. Department of Education. States can pick their own goals, both a big long-term goal and smaller, interim goals. These goals must address: proficiency on tests, English-language proficiency, and graduation rates.

There are myriad ways to participate both through giving back and our daily choices. DMS 7th grader Sophie Stevens was enthusiatic and moved by WE Day 2016, she expressed, "Whether it is cleaning up the community, or supporting a presidential candidate, everyone brings something different to the table, and gives an opportunity for change to happen. Delano High School Receives National Ranking

Newsweek, a premier weekly news magazine, recently announced the top schools in the 2016 High School Rankings. These rankings include a list of "America's Top High Schools" which identifies 500 public high schools nationwide that excel at preparing students for college as well as "Beating the Odds," a list of 500 public high schools doing an exceptional job of preparing students from disadvantaged backgrounds for college. Delano High School is ranked 369th, and one of only 17 schools in Minnesota listed in "America's Top High Schools."

Newsweek's "America's Top High Schools" identifies the top 500 schools by measuring factors including graduation rate, college enrollment rate, ACT and SAT scores and participation, AP/IB scores and participation, full time counselor to student ratio, dropout rate, enrollment in college courses during high

school, and test scores. Delano High School's ratings include a 75.3% rate for college readiness, 99.5% graduation rate and a 88.2% rate for students that are college bound.

Jim Impoco, Editor-in-Chief of Newsweek stated, "Newsweek's High School Rankings provide valuable insight into what public schools across the country are doing to prepare their students for college, which is a critical next step for graduating teens. Our analysis looks at a broad range of criteria and sheds light on schools that are setting the bar high for their students and helping them to succeed."




