Delano on AP Honor Roll

When the College Board released its 10th annual AP Honor Roll on Thursday, Dec. 5, Delano High School stood alone as the only Minnesota school to qualify.

Only 250 schools in the United States and Canada earned the honor by simultaneously increasing access to Advanced Placement courses and increasing the percentage of students earning scores of 3 or higher (out of a possible 5).

"Honor roll districts defy the expectation that expanding access automatically results in a decline in the percentage of exams earning scores of 3 or better," said Andy Houpt of the College Board.

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Delano School Board Roeser appointed to fill open seat

Susan Roeser is the newest member of the Delano School Board. She emerged from a field of 14 applicants and was sworn in on Oct. 28 to fill the seat vacated by Mark Larson, who moved out of state.

Roeser will serve until Dec. 31, 2020, and a two-year position will be on the November 2020 ballot to complete the remainder of Larson's term.

achieve excellence in all aspects of their lives," said the nomination. "She is a strong leader in her building and throughout the district."


Potter is in her 10th year of teaching, including her third in Delano. She is the science facilitator for Delano Intermediate School.

Board receives positive report from auditors

Delano School Board members heard a positive report from auditor Matt Mayer of BerganKDV during their meeting on Monday, Nov. 25.

Mayer outlined revenues and expenditures, and said that in terms of whether or not the district had a successful financial year, it outperformed its budget.

Notable observations

In addition to the information presented in the pie charts above, Mayer shared a number of other notable observations.

• "The disparities in funding from the state are really apparent in a district such as yours," he said, explaining that Delano receives about \$1,600 less in state funding per student than the average district.

Much of that is due to less special education aid ("You're

not a high special ed. district compared to your peer group," Mayer said) and less compensatory aid, which is based on poverty levels.

• Though Delano receives less aid, it also spends about \$2,000 less per student than the average district in the state.

"Your district has been fairly conservative on spending," Mayer said.

• About 63 percent of the district's budget goes directly to the classroom for regular instruction, vocational instruction and special education.

"That's a very solid number, when almost two-thirds of the dollars coming in actually get directly to the classroom," said Mayer.

The next largest areas of expenditure are for facilities at 13 percent, and pupil support (transportation) at nine percent.

• Mayer observed that the distribution of spending has

been similar in recent years, a sign of good management.

"What is kind of remarkable is that those numbers are pretty much identical from year to year," Mayer said.

"That indicates to us that you, as a board, have a good plan on where you want the dollars to be spent on a year-to-year basis. It's consistent, you hand that plan off to administration and you're able to execute on that plan on a consistent basis. So as auditors, that's something we're excited about. We like to see that consistency."

• In another indicator of successful financial management, Mayer said the district has been able to maintain its goal of keeping at least 12 percent in the unassigned fund balance.

"That number is at and over 12 percent, so again, from a financial health standpoint, you as a board can look at your district and say that you're meeting your goals and you're meeting your expectations for financial health," said Mayer.

• Although overall enrollment has declined slightly, Mayer said it has generally been stable, and Delano remains a destination district in terms of open enrollment.

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more about critical instructional practices that will improve student achievement and increase test scores on multiple assessments, both state and local.

During late starts the entire teaching staff is split into two groups: the elementary teachers (PreK-6), and the secondary teachers (7-12). Dr. Houck, along with other teacher leaders in the district, facilitate professional development opportunities that are specifically focused for the elementary group and the secondary group.

The time afforded to our teaching staff as a result of these late starts has been extremely valuable.

We are currently at a time when leaders in each group are assessing the effectiveness of the training. It is vitally important that we evaluate this initiative on multiple fronts. We want to track the implementation of these strategies in the classroom and make adjustments based on feedback from our teaching staff.

Later on in the school year I will provide you more information regarding this all-important initiative that is designed to improve student achievement in many academic areas.

2020-21 calendar

We are in the beginning stages of planning the 2020-21 school calendar. Our calendar committee will begin meeting in January.

One major problem we have is that Labor Day is on Sept. 7 next year. This creates interesting challenges for the calendar committee due to how late the school year would start. I have asked our legislators to pass a law that will allow school districts to start before Labor Day next school year.

While it will take time to see what response comes from the Legislature as a whole, the district must move forward in developing its school calendar. It is very possible that the calendar committee will create two versions of the 2020-21 school year. One version would have school begin Tuesday, Sept. 8, and another version would have school start the week before Labor Day. It is very possible that the calendar committee will recommend both versions to the school board for approval no later than March of 2020 in order to cover both possibilities.

If the Legislature passes a law early in its session that allows school districts to start before Labor Day, however, the calendar committee could simply present one version of the calendar to the school board. I will keep you all posted as our process continues, and as we await Legislative action.
