College and career planning; if it is not on the mind of a parent or student yet, it will be in the very near future. At DHS, we are continually trying to help students and parents plan for the future. During the registration process last year, I received several emails from parents asking for better high school planning documents. Delano High School had simple planning documents, but not any documents that connect student learning (our classes) to actual careers and colleges. This year, DHS has adapted the registration guide to better match our course offerings to the MN career clusters and pathways. In addition to the course guide, DHS has been working on a new initiative to help families explore connections between school and career.

High schools are charged with helping students plan for college and career. There is a new Minnesota Statute entitled, "World's Best Workforce" that was enacted last year to help students create a college and career plan. Here lies a conundrum. It is really hard to help students visualize careers within the context of classroom learning. We need to help students visualize the "bigger picture" such as how does current student learning such as a paper or assignment correlate to a future career? In order to help solve this issue and help create a link among students, parents and community members, DHS is presenting the Delano SciTech Showcase on Thursday, April 10, 2014, from 12 noon to 8:00 p.m. located on the Delano High School campus in the Tiger Activity Center.

A new Minnesota statute, "World's Best Workforce" has been enacted to help students create a college and career plan.

Delano High School, the Delano Economic Development Committee, and the Delano Chamber of Commerce have teamed up to present the Delano SciTech Showcase. At this event, our high school and middle school students will demonstrate classroom learning in an interactive way. In addition, our business community will showcase products and processes that connect to student learning. Attendees will network with universities, colleges and other higher education institutions which will relate their certificates, degrees, and programs to Delano students learning and our local businesses.

Attendance. The core of setting oneself up for success begins with the very basic tenant of getting to school. While Delano High School students have very good overall attendance (about 95% this year so far), attendance remains central to school success. Students may dislike coming to school for a variety of reasons. School may be difficult for some while uninteresting for others. Still others do not necessarily see the need for going to school.

The economic advantages of receiving a solid education are staggering. Workers with a high school diploma earned an average of \$7,100* more per year than workers who did not have a diploma in 2011. This is approximately \$70,000 each decade and more than \$450,000 in lost wages over a lifetime. Regular attendance contributes to the success of earning a diploma.

Of the top ten reasons for losing a job, absenteeism is number nine.** 15% of employers have dismissed employees for calling in without a legitimate reason. Also as adults, we know that changing a habit is extremely difficult to do. Changing habits takes time and the sooner a good habit is established, the more likely it will take hold and be replaced with a good habit. Here are some tips for good attendance:

- Go to bed at a consistent time. Oversleeping or being tired are often excuses for being late to school.
- Set a goal, make it attainable and commit to making your attendance improve.
- Parents can set up consistent rewards for improved attendance and consequences for missing school.
- Establish school and getting a good education as a priority in your home.
- Complete homework on time to be prepared for school the following day.

We want students at Delano High School to have great attendance. Our teachers go above and beyond their regular school day to ensure that their students will be successful. When students are absent, our teachers are present in the morning and/or after school in order to help them complete make-up work or catch up on items missed. We feel so strongly about this that regular attendance is stated in two of the four tenants in the Delano Way:

Show Up, Show Up on Time, Work Hard, and Failure is Not an Option.

Wright Technical Center Educational Opportunities

Delano High School is a member of the Wright Technical Center (WTC) in Buffalo. WTC provides opportunities for students in grades 11 and 12 to explore careers and develop skills as they complete high school and plan for their future. Students and parents can go to the Wright Technical Center website at http://www.wtc.k12.mn.us/ to explore what classes are available and they are also listed in DHS's registration handbook. Registering for Wright Technical Center classes are done through the DHS registration process which takes place at the end of January 2014.

To prepare for the 2014-15 course registration process, all 10th graders will be given information about Wright Technical Center from a representative from the school on Wednesday, December 18, 2013. 10th graders will then have the option to tour Wright Technical Center on Friday, January 3, 2014. All students that plan to attend the tour must complete a parent permission form. The programs available at WTC include:

- Automotive Careers
- Construction Technology
- Early Childhood/Elementary Careers
- Health Science Technology/CNA
- Law Enforcement and First Responder
- Cosmetology Careers
- Engineering I and II (Project Lead the Way)
- Landscape and Greenhouse Careers
- Welding Technology

In addition to taking courses at WTC, students who earn a B or better in classes, can earn articulated (college) credit.
